



FOREWORD

"Farnesina nel mondo per l'Italia": those are the words welcoming visitors to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs website, words which the data presented in the Statistical Yearbook 2013 illustrate in concrete form. This numerical representation of our ministry's work effectively conveys the commitment that has been a distinguishing feature of the MFA's activity throughout the world to protect and support Italy's global interests abroad: Italian citizens, businesses, language and culture. The Statistical Yearbook has a new layout and design, and the content too has been up-dated to highlight particularly significant information such as the 9% increase since 2011 in the volume of visas issued and the 5% increase in the number of Italians recorded in the Consular network's registry system. All this against the background of a reduction of nearly 3% in staff numbers.

This year, for the first time, the topics traditionally covered by the Yearbook are accompanied by others showing a Foreign Ministry less familiar to external observers. A focus on sustainability and innovation in the various spheres of our institutional activity: environmental awareness (the green Farnesina), social commitment (the socially engaged Farnesina), the reduction of paper-based document flows and increased use of information technology (digital Farnesina).

New tables are used to illustrate the Foreign Ministry's artistic assets (Farnesina Collection and Open Doors Days), cultural events organised in Rome, the ministry's study and research initiatives, and the publication of *Diplomazia Economica Italiana*, our electronic newsletter. Lastly, we have broadened the scope of our statistics on applications for recruitment competitions and on human resources in other countries' foreign ministries, which now include information on gender.

Our numbers once again tell the story of our country's growing power of attraction and the Farnesina's determination to go on working to very best effect in Italy's service worldwide.

The Statistical Yearbook is an output of the Statistics Office of the General Secretariat which coordinates, analyses and processes the statistical data gathered from the Ministry's various offices.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs is a member of the National Statistics System (SISTAN) and, as such, produces official statistics.

METHODOLOGICAL NOTES

- ▶ data are as of the 31st of December;
- ▶ the % change is calculated on the previous year;
- ▶ a dash (-) and an empty space indicate that the phenomenon does not exist or that no cases have been found; NA indicates that no data are available;
- ▶ percentages are rounded-off, thus any totalling of percentage values cannot eventually equal 100;
- ▶ in the tables, countries and missions are listed in alphabetical order;
- ▶ the main abbreviations and acronyms used in the publication are listed, in alphabetical order, in Table A;
- ▶ countries, classified in 6 areas, are listed in alphabetical order in Table B.



INTRODUCTION


The organisational chart below shows the MFA's new structure following the latest reforms:



Our network of missions abroad is composed of embassies, permanent representations, special diplomatic delegations, consulates, and Italian cultural institutes, for a total of 319 at 31 December 2012. Of these, 7 were formally established but not operational.



FIGURE 1.1 – NETWORK ABROAD BY TYPE AND GEOGRAPHICAL AREA (2012)





FIGURE 1.2 – EMBASSIES BY GEOGRAPHICAL AREA (2012)





Italian Cultural Institutes show a similar breakdown, with 36 in the European Union and 10 in extra european countries, followed by the Americas, with 19, Asia and Oceania with 12, the Mediterranean and M.E. with 10, and Sub-Saharan Africa with 3 cultural institutes.

HUMAN RESOURCES

At 31 December 2012 the Ministry of Foreign Affairs had 7,700 people on its payroll. Of these, 4,215 were permanent staff, 2,644 were non-permanent staff, and 841 were permanent staff seconded from other government departments. A breakdown by gender shows that 47% of MFA employees are female and 53% male.

The breakdown of staff serving abroad (figure 1.5) is as follows: 30% in missions in the European Union, 15% in extra european countries, 22% in the Americas, 12% in the Mediterranean and M.E., 8% in Sub-Saharan Africa and 13% in Asia and Oceania

FIGURE 1.5 - STAFF SERVING ABROAD (2012)




FINANCIAL RESOURCES

The Foreign Ministry's budget for 2013, excluding Official Development Assistance, amounts to 1,610 million Euro. This shows a slight increase (0.8%) on the figure for 2012 (as a result of the smaller cuts envisaged for 2013 by Legislative Decree 138/2011).

If we include the increase in funding for Official Development Assistance, the total budget amounts to 1,837 million Euro, an increase of 9% on the previous year.

FIGURE 1.7 – MFA BUDGET





FIGURE 1.8 – MINISTRY OF FOREIGN AFFAIRS BUDGET: PERCENTAGE OF THE NATIONAL BUDGET





FIGURE 2.1 – VISITS AND MEETINGS (NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL)




FIGURE 2.5 – INTERVENTIONS BY THE MINISTRY'S CRISIS UNIT ON BEHALF OF ITALIAN NATIONALS IN EMERGENCY SITUATIONS



FIGURE 2.7 – ISSUED VISAS BY PURPOSE (2012)





Italian language and culture courses abroad (under Legislative Decree 297/1994, pursuant to Law 153/1971) are open to Italian and foreign nationals and are intended both for schools (pupils of compulsory school age) and for adults. About 75% of the courses are included in the school curriculum, mainly through agreements with the local educational authorities. The others are organised outside the normal timetable, often as an introduction to the curricular courses or to support the educational inclusion of the children of Italian nationals. Courses are run by private local organisations (the "Enti Gestori"), which receive specific funding from the ministry for this purpose. They are held by teachers recruited locally by the Enti, or by state-sector teachers sent from Italy.

INTRODUCTION

This chapter compares the figures illustrating the Italian MFA's structures and human and financial resources with those of other countries' foreign ministries: in G8 member countries, our European partner countries and emerging and dynamic economies such as India and Brazil. It also includes information on Development Cooperation initiatives, Italy's contribution to the United Nations and European Union budgets, and figures for visas issued in the Schengen area.

The figures for this sector, and financial figures in particular, are not always immediately available. Similarly, direct comparisons with countries that have different institutional structures and types of resources from our own are not always easy. The gender-related information in the sections on human resources in other foreign ministries, which appear in the Yearbook for the first time this year, was particularly uneven.
